Everyday Child Learning Activity Checklist

This checklist includes practices to increase child participation in interest-based family, community, and classroom activities that are best suited or promoting child learning and development. The activities are ones that best match a child's interests, invite child participation and engagement in the activities, and afford a child multiple, varied, and rich learning opportunities.

The checklist can be used to increase your understanding and use of the everyday child learning activity practices. It can be used during observations of children in everyday activities to determine the extent to which the use of learning activities was consistent with the checklist practices. It also can be used to plan or to help a parent plan how to increase child participation in everyday interest-based learning activities. Finally, the checklist can be used in self-evaluations to examine the use of the practices against the checklist indicators.
